Corrugated case material prices in decline, manufacturers launch €100/t price hike

In a continuation of what happened in the fourth quarter of 2024, Italian corrugated case material prices are pointing lower at the start of 2025. Market players are mostly reporting price cuts of €10-15/t for both recycled and primary fibre-based containerboard grades in January.

Paper manufacturers described demand as "still low" to "adequate" in January. In EUWID interviews, few manufacturers were pleased with how sales had shaped up. Sources said that converters had run down their stocks by December and then ordered a bit more paper at lower prices starting in the second week of January to build up somewhat of a buffer. Notwithstanding this development,

paper mills said that their order intake left something to be desired. Inventory restocking was insufficient to maintain good machine utilisation rates, given ample supply and surplus capacity on the market.

In light of this situation, a few recycled corrugated case material manufacturers spontaneously decided to extend their stoppages by a few days. Others continue to leverage low freight rates for shipping to Asia and Africa to sell more paper on export markets.

Converters reported being a little busier, with their demand for paper in keeping with this situation. One packaging manufacturer pointed out that demand from the food industry, in particular, was ensuring healthy order books. Yet, some market players are having a harder time than others

in this segment, too. Business for e-commerce packaging had slowed again after Christmas shopping was over. At the same time, many industrial sectors continued to lack momentum in the current economic climate, one converter stressed.

January's price cut has put particular pressure on recycled corrugated case material manufacturers. Yet, kraftliner suppliers are also seeing their profits put in jeopardy by smaller margins and lower sales volumes. Both have launched a fresh round of price talks as a result, with most producers proposing hikes of €90-100/t. These higher prices should apply to deliveries of recycled grades from February and to deliveries of fresh fibre-based grades from March.
